# Dean Cobb Will Depart to Become Interim at St. Mark's in Philadelphia

Our interim rector, the Rev. David C. Cobb, has announced that his time with us is coming to an end. Next month he will become interim rector at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Philadelphia.

Dean Cobb's last Sunday with us is May 12. We will say farewell to him at receptions after both services.

"We appreciate so much David's leadership during his time with us," Senior Warden Lucas Fleming said. "His wisdom and experience provided guidance during this time of transition for the Cathedral."

Dean Cobb, who joined us in January, initially expected to be with us until shortly before our new dean joins us, likely in early fall. He cited two reasons for his decision to leave St. Peter's earlier than anticipated.

"Back when I was first contacted in late November 2023 by Canon Richard Norman about the Cathedral, my wife, Ruth, and I were pondering a move from Sarasota, where we live," he said. "Over the next few months we concluded that we want to be

in the mid-Atlantic region to be closer to family.

"Things moved more quickly than expected after I received a phone call from St. Mark's, which is seeking an interim. After conversations with Bishop Scharf, I have accepted their call to serve as interim rector for two years," Dean Cobb said.

Bishop Scharf has informed the Chapter that

there are no plans to seek another interim. The Search Committee is about to receive the names of candidates and will move ahead with interviews.

St. Mark's is a historically Anglo-Catholic

congregation, which fits well with Dean Cobb's theology. Dean Cobb and Mrs. Cobb were in Philadelphia on April 25 to join in the celebration of the patronal festival, St. Mark's Day, as the congregation observes the 175th anniversary of their founding.

Among the church's benefactors was Rodman Wanamaker (1863-1928), heir to the Wanamaker department-store fortune, who memorialized his late beloved wife, Fernanda, with gifts of money and artwork to beautify and expand the church with priceless ecclesiastical treasures.

St. Mark's serves a weekly breakfast on Saturdays for the homeless, provides a food pantry several days a week, and hosts an Episcopal Service Corps program that provides young adult interns an experience in intentional community and direct involvement in parish ministry and at St. James'

School, a tuition-free Episcopal school for at-risk students in grades 4 through 8.

As he prepares to leave St. Peter's, Dean Cobb said, "It has been a real joy and blessing to get to know this community and I have been grateful for the many encouraging words from parishioners. I have been grateful to work alongside your staff, who have been effective leaders for some time now.

"The Cathedral is in good hands and is moving towards the call of a new dean," he said. "I hope that my presence has given some support to the staff and that having a different voice in the pulpit and another presence at the altar has been some small step towards your readiness to welcome your new dean."

Dean Cobb concluded: "I look forward to being with you through May 12, to say farewell and to say thank you in person for making me a part of this Cathedral's life and worship. You are all in my prayers as we continue to seek to know and serve Christ and to follow his call to each of us."

### With Beeswax, Dye, and Meditation We Created Beautiful Pysanky

We welcomed 30 artists for our second annual Pysanky event April 20. Our workshop leader, Johanna Krynytzky of Gulfport, has been "writing" these

eggs with beeswax and dye since she was old enough to hold a kistka (a hot wax pen), taught by her mother and grandmother. Most of the participants were from the wider Tampa Bay community who have family



roots in Ukraine and Eastern Europe, or who wanted to learn more about this ancient art of decorating eggs with hot wax. The group enjoyed a fun and meditative day learning about the symbolism found on pysanky and the variety of designs from geographic areas of Ukraine, and creating our own meaningful designs. The whole process is a labor of love and a wonderful practice of accepting our mistakes and letting go of expectations. As Johanna would often remind us, there are no mistakes! We plan to do this again next year, so please join us.

# Dean Search: We're Awaiting Applications from Our Candidates

May 1 was the deadline for applications for the position of dean of the Cathedral.

All applications were sent directly to Bishop Scharf. He and Canon Richard Norman will review the applications, make reference checks with the candidates' bishops, and forward to the Search Committee those who seem like good matches for what we are seeking.

Then the Search Committee will begin a process of reviewing the applications, conducting Zoom interviews, and doing further reference checks on the candidates.

"Please don't ask how many, or who, or where they're from," Co-Chair Ray McColgan said. "We know everyone is very curious, but we're operating under strict confidentiality, and we will politely but firmly decline to answer any questions."

"What everyone can do now is to continue to pray for the candidates and for the committee," Co-Chair Judy Stark said. "We love hearing the Prayers of the People every Sunday that lift up the work of the Search Committee. We're going to need those prayers more than ever as we get into the deep work of discerning with our candidates who our next dean should be."



### We Continue Planning for Tower and Roof Repair

Our plans to repair the bell tower, re-roof the worship space, and restore the carillon are moving closer to reality.

At its April meeting the Chapter received the report from a structural engineer on the scope of work for repairing the bell tower. A briefing is planned with the engineer and other key players to walk through the report and answer questions and

begin to sketch out a timetable and costs for the work.

The Chapter has designated repairing the tower and getting the bells and carillon back in working order as an anniversary project this year as we celebrate the 55th anniversary of our designation as the Cathedral for the Diocese of Southwest Florida (1969); our 135th year as a worshiping community (1889); and the 125th anniversary of the completion of our original worship space (1899).

Those who work in the Children's Chapel, Harriet Bedell Room, Nursery, and the Music Suite will be happy to know that repairs will be made shortly on the air-conditioning system in that part of the building.

# The Joyous 'Great 50 Days of Easter' Lead Us To the Feasts of Ascension Day and Pentecost



We are well into the Great 50 Days of Easter, the seven weeks that follow the Resurrection.

Look around the Cathedral for the signs and symbols of the season. The Paschal Candle burns at the altar during services to symbolize the risen Christ, the fire of the Holy Spirit, and the pillar of fire that led the Israelites out of bondage.

We've brought back the "Alleluias" in our worship. Joyful music and colorful flowers have returned, and the altar hangings and vestments are white.

During Easter Season we read from the Book of Acts rather than from the Old Testament. We hear the stories of Jesus's appearances to his disciples and others and of the start of the spread of what became known as Christianity throughout the world.

On Pentecost Sunday the pulpit will be dressed in a red silk fall with a flame motif.

Easter Season includes the principal feast of Ascension Day, on May 9, when Jesus ascended into heaven. This day is set in scripture: Acts 1:1-5, 10-11. On this day we acknowledge that Jesus is no longer here, bodily, on earth, limited to one place or one time. We recognize him as King of Kings and Lord of Lords, seated in glory with the Father, and accessible everywhere, all the time, to everyone.

The season ends on May 19 with Pentecost ("50th Day"), regarded as the birthday of the church. That's the day we hear about the mighty wind and the tongues of flame as the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples.

The color of the day is red. Look for the gorgeous needlepoint frontal on the altar in St. Mary's Chapel, and the Jacobean brocade frontal on the high altar. At the pulpit, you'll see a fall in red silk with a flame mo-

tif, and the presider will wear a red silk chasuble with an image of a descending dove on the back. (You're invited to wear red too to show your celebratory spirit.)

In Jewish tradition this festival marks the day that the Law was given to Moses, seven weeks — 50 days — after Passover. The disciples were gathered in Jerusalem for that celebration, the Feast of Weeks, or Shavuot. It was customary for Jews from all over the world to gather in Jerusalem for this celebration. That is why, as Acts 2:5 puts it, "there were dwelling in Jerusalem Jews, devout people from every nation under heaven."

To the surprise of Jesus's disciples (and, indeed, everyone present), they received the promised gift of the Holy Spirit as tongues of flame appeared above their heads and the rush of a mighty wind filled the house where they were gathered. They found themselves able to speak in many languages, therefore able to take the Good News of Jesus into all the world.

The Holy Spirit, then, is a community-

creator that brought together as followers of Jesus people from disparate lands — "Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs."

All were able to hear the disciples speaking about God's deeds of power in their own languages. This is why we often read the story of Pentecost in multiple languages from the lectern.

This message of inclusivity is emphasized in Peter's words: God will pour out God's spirit on "all flesh ... your sons and your daughters ... young men ... and your old men ... even upon my slaves, both men and women ... everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

Pentecost is a single day, not

The following Sunday, the First Sunday After Pentecost, is celebrated as Trinity Sunday, when we acknowledge "the three in one, the one in three." From then until November — 26 more Sundays! we are in the Season After Pentecost, the "long green season" of the ordered life of the church. We'll say more about that next month.

Perhaps you've heard children's laughter coming from the Cathedral classrooms the last few Saturday mornings and have wondered what's going on. It's a new partnership between the Cathedral and our downtown neighbor, American Stage Theatre Co.

American Stage is a professional Equity theater offering world-class live performances year-round from its location on Third Street N across Williams Park. In addition to its mainstage performances, American Stage offers weekend classes to kids of all ages. Recently, unforeseen circumstances led to a loss of classroom space and American Stage needed an alternative.

After touring St. Peter's, Helen Murray, American Stage's producing artistic director, agreed that our classrooms would be a perfect spot for children's classes. And so a partnership emerged. The Cathedral agreed to donate its unused classroom space for theater classes on Saturdays. In return, we receive acknowledgment as an Education Sponsor in future electronic and print media produced by American Stage, plus discounts to current and future productions (including *Beauty and the Beast*, currently running at the park in Demens Landing see story on Page 5 for details).

The first classes began on April 5 and continue on Saturdays through May. Said Helen Murray: "It has been the most uneventful and peaceful transition ever! The students love it there, the teachers love it there, and you all have made it so easy. I cannot thank you enough!"

The partnership is a true win-win as it increases the Cathedral's profile in the community while furthering our support of the performing arts in St. Petersburg and giving kids the chance to realize their dreams of one day taking the stage. ### We'll Remember Priest-Activist Pauli Murray With Jazz Vespers, Guest Preacher

At our second annual Jazz Vespers **next month** celebrating the life and ministry of the Rev. Pauli Murray, the first Black female priest in the Episcopal Church, we will welcome the Rev. Janettarose Greene as our guest preacher.

Murray (1910-1985) was an American civil rights activist, advocate, legal scholar and theorist, and author. Her work influenced the civil-rights movement and expanded legal protection for gender equality.

Mother Greene had a long first career in the federal government. She graduated from Virginia Theological Seminary in 2023 (along with our curate, the Rev. Mike Alford) and is assistant to the rector at St. Mary's in Arlington, VA, where she oversees pastoral care, children and youth formation, and community outreach.



The Rev. Janettarose Greene "The Rev. Pauli Murray played a little-known but significant role in civil rights. She was an activist, lawyer, poet, and writer who fought against racial and gender discrimination. Her work paved the way for equality and justice for many marginalized groups." Mother Greene said. "Reflecting on her legacy inspires me to advocate for social justice and equality in my own life."

The Vespers are at 5 p.m. Sunday, June 23, with a reception to follow.

# A Great Racehorse and the Unsung Black Horsemen Who Made His Success Possible


What better month than May for the St. Petersburg Book Club to read *Horse* by Pulitzer Prize winner Geraldine Brooks? The Kentucky Derby is May 4; the Preakness is May 18; and the Belmont Stakes is June 8.

On May 28, in the Chapter Room, Susan Darrow will share Horse, a 2022 book based on the remarkable true story of the thoroughbred Lexington, who was born in 1850 and a few years later amassed record-setting victories across the South, even as the nation reeled toward war.

This is a sweeping story of the greatest racehorse in American history; the enslaved groom who protected him; the artist who immortalized him; and the scientist and the art historian who uncovered the history of the unsung Black horsemen who were critical to the stallion's racing success.

It's a story of "bloodlines and broodmares; farriers and knackeries; wild gambles, wild gallops and plantation-era grotesqueries. A dollop of Civil War valour. And at the center of it all, a love story: a boy and his horse," *The Guardian* reviewer said.

### Clothes to Kids Is Our May Giving Opportunity

The Community Caring and Sharing committee will collect new underwear and socks for Clothes to Kids in May.

This nonprofit organization operates "stores" in St. Petersburg, Tampa, and Clearwater, providing new and gentlyused school clothing in a bright and cheerful department-store environment for children who are at-risk or eligible for free or reduced-price school lunches.



Each year Clothes to Kids distributes more than 80,000 pairs of underwear. Last year 16,411 free wardrobes were distributed. The Cathedral gave a \$500 microgrant to this charity in 2023 and also collected items of clothing.

Our contributions will go to students from kindergarten through high school, so all sizes are welcome. New or gently-used clothes and shoes are also welcome, but underwear and socks must be new.
