Search Committee Is Named; Now, Get Ready to Take Our Survey

We have taken two big steps forward in the search for our next dean.

"We're delighted to have such a solid team to work with," Ray said. "There is a good cross-section here of the various demographics in the Cathedral family — old and young, longtimers and newcomers, people with involvement in a variety of areas and ministries."

"This is a great team," Judy said. "We have a lot of hard work to do in a short

time, and I know these are faithful and devoted parishioners who will bring their best to the holy tasks ahead of us."

As for those who offered themselves as candidates for the committee but were not selected, "we're hoping that they'll be ambassadors to encourage people to participate in our survey and, later, in listening sessions to hear what is on the mind of the congregation," Judy said.

To that end — hearing from everyone — later this month we will conduct a parish-wide survey. This will be facilitated by Holy Cow Consulting, an Ohiobased group that specializes in surveys of religious denominations. A Holy Cow survey is required of every parish that is seeking new clergy leadership in the Diocese of Southwest Florida.

You'll be hearing more about the sur-

vey in the first two weeks of October. The plan is that the survey will go live online for three weeks starting in mid-October. If you don't have computer access, we will have people available on Sunday mornings with laptops to help you take the survey. Watch for details.

"It's important that we get a high rate of response to the survey so the results really represent the full Cathedral," Ray said.

"This is your chance to be

heard. The results of the survey will shape our profile and our search and our ultimate call of a new dean, so please do take advantage of this chance to let us know what you think."

Other Chapter Actions

At the September meeting of the Chapter, Senior Warden Lucas Fleming reported that Bishop Doug Scharf continues to seek an interim dean for the Cathedral. "He is committed to finding the right person for us," Lucas said. Some candidates were considered but "were not the right fit, and we are grateful to the bishop for listening to us. We want the right person too."

In November we look forward to welcoming back our retired priest, the Rev. Sam Tallman, who now divides his time between Blowing Rock, NC, and St. Petersburg. He will assist with worship and pastoral care through the winter.

You've seen the presence of a St. Petersburg Police officer on Sunday mornings to promote safety and security. In that same vein, we will begin asking those who bring backpacks or large bags onto the premises to leave those items at the front desk during worship.

Can You Help Us Find Housing?

As we continue to seek an interim dean, one of our concerns — and expenses — will be housing for this person.

If you have a furnished apartment or condo (or know of one) that is available from December or January through June or July, please speak to our Junior Warden, Susan Darrow (sdarrow99@me.com).

"The high cost of housing in St. Petersburg is a significant figure in our budget for the search process," Susan said. "We're hoping that within the Cathedral family we can find appropriate housing at a reasonable price."

The Anthem is Bairstow's "Let all mortal flesh keep silence," and the concluding hymn is No. 545, "Lo! What a cloud of witnesses."


The Cathedral Chamber Choir sings. Dwight Thomas is music director and organist.

There's Room for You on Our Pilgrimage to Civil-Rights Sites in Alabama

There's still time to register for our four-day pilgrimage in April 2024 to significant racial and social-justice sites in Montgomery, Selma, and Tuskegee, AL. The Cathedral's Becoming Beloved Community committee invites those well-versed in justice issues and those just beginning the journey.

A series of events took place in Alabama and throughout the South in the 1950s and '60s that culminated in the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965. On this pilgrimage you'll learn how each event — from the day in 1955 when Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a bus in Montgomery to the 1965 Selma-to-Montgomery March — moved the arc of the universe a little closer to justice.

Among the sites we'll visit is the National Memorial and Museum for Peace

and Justice in Montgomery, with its compelling display of memorials honoring more than 4,000 people who were lynched during the Jim Crow era, and the Legacy Museum, which traces our nation's history "from enslavement to mass incarceration."

The journey follows the stories of those who marched, protested, and died in the struggle to shine light upon the inequalities and injustices in the land where all are "created equal." Each day adds a new layer of understanding and perspective to current conversations about privilege and prejudice. The struggle for civil rights is inextricably tied up with our faith commitment to the Gospel values of dignity, peace, and equality.


Microgrants of \$200 to \$750 will be awarded in early November. The deadline for applications is October 13.

Here's the story: A fierce supporter of a presidential candidate disappears from a swank Palm Beach gala and turns up dead. The candidate immediately blames rampaging immigrant hordes. Meanwhile, his wife has a few too many secrets with a member of the Secret Service, and there is a sudden invasion of pythons. Squeeze Me is the latest from the longtime Miami Herald columnist, novelist, and humorist. "Squeeze Me perfectly captures the absurdity of our times," one reviewer said.

volves two in-person meetings and eight biweekly Zoom sessions, from October through March.

The series draws on powerful documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European-American histories. It invites participants to unpack their own histories and

experiences in a safe space. The 10 sessions cover a wide range of issues and challenges of race and racism in this country.

> grow. We have the responsibility to examine what we think we know. We will not be perfect.



Center for the Arts Offers 'Parade,' Broadway Musical Dealing with Lynching, Prejudice, Injustice

The Pinellas County Center for the Arts will offer three performances this month of the Broadway musical *Parade*, a Tony Award-winning show that addresses difficult issues of prejudice, hate, political injustice, and racial tension at a time when those are the stuff of front-page headlines.

Parade tells the story of Leo Frank, a Jewish American who in 1913 was convicted of rape and murder in Georgia and was lynched by a mob. Frank is thought to have been the first white person in America to be lynched.

Parade opened on Broadway in December 1998 and that season won Tony awards for Best Book and Best Original Score and six Drama Desk awards. A revival this year won two Tony Awards, including Best Revival of a Musical and Best Direction of a Musical.

Frank, a pencil factory manager, was accused of the rape and murder of a 13-year-

old female employee. He was convicted and sentenced to death. The governor of Georgia in 1915 commuted his sentence to life based on concerns about the conduct of the trial. While Frank was being transferred between prisons he was seized by a mob and hanged from a tree. Subsequently it became clear that Frank was innocent and the most likely suspect was an ex-con janitor who worked at the factory and was the primary witness against Frank.

All this occurred at a time of rising antisemitism. The trial breathed new life into the defunct Ku Klux Klan and led to the creation of the Jewish Anti-Defamation League.

"The musical score is extremely well-written and compelling — and very difficult, which the cast is handling very well," said Cathedral Music Director Dwight Thomas, who is staff accompanist at PCCA. "It is a dark musical and the subject matter can get

very uncomfortable at times."

The production, directed by Dustin Hinzman, theater chair for PCCA, has the full approval of the Gibbs High principal and the Pinellas County School Board.

Beloved Community Movie Night: 'Just Mercy'

On Friday, October 13, at 5:30 p.m., we'll show *Just Mercy*, a film centered around themes of empathy, equity, hope, and resilience. The story follows Harvard Law School graduate Bryan Stevenson's move to Alabama, where he recognizes an urgent need to provide free legal assistance to minorities who have been unfairly sentenced.

Stevenson initiated the National Memorial for Peace and Justice in Montgomery, AL, which honors more than 4,000 African-Americans lynched in the 12 states of the South from 1877 to 1950. Our pilgrimage next April to the Civil Rights sites in Alabama (see page 15) includes a visit to the memorial.
