Meet Our Speakers

The Theory and Practice of the Seven Deadly Sins | The Rev. Canon Dr. Thomas Williams A seriously scholarly -- and very wicked -- examination of a subject on which all of us are experts.

The Rev. Canon Dr. Thomas Williams, canon theologian at St. Peter's Cathedral, is Professor of Philosophy at the University of South Florida. He has published widely on medieval philosophy and theology. His most recent work includes *The Cambridge Companion to Medieval Ethics* and a new translation of Augustine's *Confessions*.

He received a \$138,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to support his translation volume, *John Duns Scotus: Selected Readings in Ethics* (Oxford University Press, 2017).

Born in Memphis, TN, Canon Williams is a 1988 graduate of Vanderbilt University and earned a Ph.D. in philosophy from Notre Dame in 1994. Before coming to USF he taught at the University of Iowa, where he received the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences Collegiate Teaching Award in 2005.

"I was brought up in Southern Baptist churches but was drawn into the Episcopal Church in high school," Canon Williams says. "Interesting fact: Inviting people to go to church with you actually works!"

A fine singer who performs with the Cathedral's Chamber Choir and an excellent pianist, Canon Williams began taking piano lessons at the age of four and became an organist "when I got to college, mainly because the campus Episcopal chapel needed an organist and, as a pianist, I was the closest thing available."

Living Transparently in Our Diversity, Finding Common Ground

The Very Rev. Dr. John Shepherd is the interim director of the Anglican Centre in Rome and the Archbishop of Canterbury's Representative to the Holy See.

From 1990 to 2014 he was the dean of St. George's Cathedral in Perth, Australia. He led a \$19-million capital campaign to restore the Cathedral and the old deanery and to create the Cadogan Song School, an architecturally stunning -- and prize-winning -- building that houses the Cathedral choirs and its music library (https://www.perthcathedral.org/About-Us/the-cadogan-song-school.html).

The Cathedral's longest-serving dean, he invited Muslim and Buddhist speakers to the Cathedral, preached in a Catholic cathedral, and founded the theological study group Heretics Anonymous. He flew football and basketball team flags from the cathedral tower and hosted concerts, ballet and cabaret shows. He has lent public support to LGBT inclusion and marriage equality.

"I've been very keen to offer a faith for thinking Christians, encouraging people to turn the diamond and look at different ways of experiencing the divine, music, arts and architecture," he said in a newspaper interview.

Dean Shepherd earned degrees from the University of Melbourne and the Australian College of Theology. He has a Master of Sacred Music degree from Union Theological Seminary, where he studied musicology and composition, including both serial and electronic, at Columbia University. His Ph.D. dissertation, from St. Catharine's College, Cambridge, studied the relationship between the theology and music of the English Reformation.

The Salvador Dali Museum

The art of the Spanish surrealist Salvador Dali is so much more than the melting clocks you've seen on T-shirts and postcards. The architecturally stunning Dali Museum (<u>thedali.org</u>), in the shape of a double helix, houses the largest collection of Dali's works outside Europe and is a destination for visitors from around the world.

At lunch, museum executive director Hank Hine will share his thoughts on how physical space — such as this unique museum — inspires and influences us. Then we'll break up into smaller groups for docent-led tours. Learn what influenced Dali, as a faithful Roman Catholic, and see the religious-themed works that influenced others, including his masterwork, "The Ecumenical Council." The current special exhibit, "Magritte & Dali," shows how the world's two most celebrated surrealists influenced each other. Outside, walk the labyrinth that overlooks Tampa Bay.
